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Introduction

Pepeha

'E kore rawa e mōnehunehu Te pūmanawanui ki tō tātou reo rangatira, Te mātahi o te tau ki te ura mai o te motu Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Manawatū ki Rangitāne.'

We are fully committed to the notion that Kura Kaupapa Māori is a Māori initiative dedicated to the preservation and maintenance of the Māori language as a taonga, which is guaranteed protection under the Tready of Waitangi, and the Māori Language Act, 1987.

Te Tūmomo Kura

Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Manawatū (Kura) is a full primary school that is guided by the principles and practices of "Te Aho Matua" combined with the National Education Goals (NEGS) as promulgated by the Ministry of Education.

In combining these two very different philosophies, we will map out a pathway, which seamlessly merges both, allowing tamariki & mokopuna to move confidently in both Te Ao Māori (The Māori World) and Te Ao Whānui (The Global World).

Whāia te iti kahurangi Ki te tūohu koe Me he maunga teitei. (Te Aho Matua 5)

The highest standards of achievement, through programmes, which enable all tauira to realise their full potential as individuals, and to develop the values, needed to become full members of New Zealand's society.

(National Education Goal 1)

Te Āhua O Te Kura

He mea tino nui te wāhi ako hei whakaohooho i te wairua o te tamaiti ki ana mahi whakaako. Nō reira, kia kikii tonu ngā mea whakaihiihi i a ia, i ngā mea pupuri hoki i te hā o te ao Māori. Me whakawhānui hoki tōna wāhi ako ki ngā marae, ki ngā ngahere, ki waenga parae, ki te taha moana, ki ngā wharepukapuka, ki ngā wharetaonga me ērā atu whare whāngai i te puna o te mōhio. (Te Aho Matua 5.10)

'Rapua Te Kura Tika' was the name of the working party that worked to establish the Kura, two years prior to the Kura opening on 26 February 1990. This roopū emerged from a hui held at Te Awhina Kohanga Reo in 1987, where parents and kaumātua discussed their aspirations to have their tamariki / mokopuna educated in an environment that validated and promoted Māori language, knowledge and values.

Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Manawatū began with 14 tamariki / mokopuna, and now has a roll of over 100 tamariki / mokopuna starting from Tau 0 (5 years old) to Tau 8 (13 years old). The Kura's first home was at the old Hospital on Maxwell's Line, and in 1994 we moved to our current purpose built site here at 88 Rhodes Drive. We have a diverse ethnic composition of Whānau, embracing Māori, Non Māori and Pacifika. Our whānau live across the rohe encompassing Palmerston North city, Linton, Foxton Beach, Ashhurst, Feilding, and Marton.

In 2008 a further two new purpose – built akomanga were completed. A boundary fence was also completed at the south end of the Kura which has improved security and enhanced the aesthetics of the grounds.

We operate under the guidance and tikanga of Te Aho Matua. Te Aho Matua was written by the forerunners of Kura Kaupapa Māori as a foundation document for their kura. It is written in a typically elliptical Māori style which implies meaning and requires interpretation rather than translation.

The document lays down the principles by which Kura Kaupapa Māori identify themselves as a a unified group committed to a unique schooling system which is regarded as being vital to the eduction of our tamariki. Te Aho Matua provides a philosophical base for the teaching and learning of children and provides policy guidelines for parents, teachers and boards of trustees in their respective roles and

responsibilities. Te Aho Matua is intended for inclusion in the charters of Kura Kaupapa Māori as the means to identify and support the unique nature that they behold and which clearly articulates this uniqueness from mainstream kura.

Our entry criteria stipulates that all tauira must be able to sustain a full day's learning in Te Reo Māori, and that whānau are engaged and willing to participate in a whānau centered learning environment.

The Whānau is supportive, assisting in numerous ways including fundraising ventures for EOTC, hui and kaupapa specific projects. There is a strong desire for tauira to have exposure to a full range of learning opportunities and experiences, while keeping a hold of the values that make the Kura unique.

The National Education Guidelines (NEGs) incorporates the national education goals, foundation curriculum policy statements, national curriculum statements, national standards, and national administration guidelines, for the time being in force under s60A of the Education Act 1989. The National Administration Guidelines (NAGs) set out statements of desirable principles of conduct or administration for all schools administration. These are monitored and reviewed on a regular basis in the governance documents for the Kura. These documents are kept in the Tari and accessible should whānau wish to peruse them.

Te Moemoeā

Ko tā ngā mātua, ko tā te whānau, ko tā te kura hoki, he mea awhi, he mea whāngai, he mea whakaako i te tamaiti kia tupu ora ai tāna katoa i te tika me te maungārongo. (Te Ao Matua 1.2)

Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Manawatū will provide excellence through challenging, stimulating learning environments and quality education that will develop all students into lifelong learners, nurturing their pride in being Māori to stand confidently and competently in this modern and ever changing world.

Te Uaratanga

To offer a secure, caring, learning environment where the unique potential of each tauira is developed and where the appropriate life skills are provided through the values of our kura, eclectic teaching strategies and strong whānau and community support.

Te Reo Māori

We offer all children educational instruction in a total immersion Māori setting enriched with both traditional and contemporary methods of learning.

In addition to the normal programme of study, we offer enhanced programmes of learning such as Porowhā,

Pāngarau – Te Poutama Tau

Te Poutama Tau is a national numeracy programme that has recorded an improved performance by all children in mathematics utilising the latest research, teaching techniques and resources.

Tikanga-ā-Iwi

Our philosophy is to uphold the mana of each individual, to respect differences and to also find similarities with other indigenous cultures and all peoples. We see ourselves as global citizens of the world-wide community and offer all tauira from years 6 – 8 opportunities to actively participate as global citizens by travelling overseas to different countries, experiencing first-hand the richness and contrast of each culture in addition to sharing their own culture.

Each year, we actively participate in Te Pae Tamariki, a celebration of our Māori culture and language. This is a very special event for the kura whānau, and all students take this opportunity to showcase their talents and pay homage to our ancestors for the taonga of song, rhythm and rhyme.

Ngā Toi

From performing arts to technical drawing, students will enjoy various aspects of producing colourful and interesting pieces of art with different methods and tools.

From years 5-8, all students aim to participate in the bi-annual National Primary Schools' Kapa Haka Competition at various venues around Aotearoa. Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Manawatū was the first school from the region that has participated at this level.

English

All students have the opportunity to learn English when they reach year 6.

ICT

All students will have the opportunity to learn how to use digital cameras, iPads and their functions. This will lead on to the production of their own iMovies utilising the latest in Mac computer applications.

Pūtaiao

Students gain knowledge of living elements in their environment, of how things work and why with practical hands on lessons. Theories are tested and students are encouraged to critique and challenge science through a Māori world view.

Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Manawatū has successfully participated in science fairs and attend annual Science Roadshows which they enjoy.

Immunisation and Birth Certificate

We are required by law to sight immunisation certificates of new enrolments born from January 1995 (Health Immunisation regulation 1995). We also request to sight a copy of birth certificate for date of birth verification. Please bring in a copy of your child's immunisation and birth certificate at the time of enrolment.

Lunches

This year kura will participate in the 'Ka Ora, Ka Ako' Healthy Lunches in School's Programme. This is initiated and funded by the Ministry of Education and will run for the entire year. Mātua mā are required to send your tamaiti into kura with a healthy morning tea. Whānau also have the option to send in additional kai should you choose.

Please note that water is the only permitted drink to be brought into kura.

Special kai and drink is permitted on special occasions (eg: Te Puāwaitanga), but this is at the discretion of the Tumuaki. Fizzy, energy drinks and orange juice are banned and not to be brought to kura.

Fundraising

We are often fundraising for a (good!) reason or another, and although at times this may seem tiresome, whānau support is crucial. If you have any good fundraising ideas, and/or you're willing to supervise a venture, please leave your idea, and/or name at the tari



Finance

Invoices - (Whānau Accounts)

Upon enrolment of your tamaiti at kura, you will be set up with a whānau account. Provided you are not over \$200 in debit you may charge any purchases, trip expenses or hākinakina fees to your account. If you are eligible for Transport Pūtea, this will be credited to your account at the start of each term. If you are over \$200 in credit you will be asked to withdraw some of this pūtea.

Trips and Excursions - There are often off-site activities that the Kura participate in. Date/s and any associated costs are normally advertised well in advance. Mātua are asked to meet the costs associated with any of these activities, which are always kept to an absolute minimum.

Te Puāwaitanga Fund - The Te Puāwaitanga Fund of \$60 per tamaiti/per year is a savings that accumulates for your child's graduation when they reach Tau 8. \$10 per year of the \$60 is utilised to pay for your child's meal for the current year which leaves a total of \$50 per year saved. Should your child be a transfer student then the amount you pay per year will be calculated based on the amount of years your child will be at Kura. Again, this is not compulsory, but if not paid will affect what your child's year group can afford to do for their graduation. See the table below to work out how much you will be expected to pay per year:

Please be aware that if your account is over the \$200 in debit limit you will not be able to charge any of these to your account.

Transport Pūtea - The criteria for Transport Pūtea is based on the distance you travel from home to kura. Students that live more than 3.2 kilometres from Kura are eligible however the amount you receive is based on how many days your tamaiti or tamariki attend school during the term. It is the whānau's responsibility to inform the Tari of any change of circumstances that could change their entitlement to this Pūtea; eg: Change of Address. We also request that you provide confirmation of your address; ie letter from an organisation dated in the last four months with your name and address eg PNCC Rates, Power Account, Telephone Account — please note we only require a photocopy of the letterhead with your name and address. Any Transport Pūtea entitlement will in the first instance be used to offset any outstanding debt owing to the Kura. Any surplus will be credited to your whānau account. Upon request a refund can be issued.

1. Te Ira Tangata

Ahakoa iti He iti māpihi pounamu

He kākano i ruia mai i Rangiātea E kore ai e ngaro

Kia mārama rawa te hunga whakaako ki te āhua o te tangata, kātahi anō ka taea te hanga kaupapa whakaako mō te hunga tamariki.

- 1. Nō ngā Rangi Tūhāhā te wairua o te tangata. I tōna whakairatanga ka hono te wairua me te tinana o te tangata. I tērā wā tonu ka tau tōna mauri, tōna tapu, tōna wehi, tōna iho matua, tōna mana, tōna ihi, tōna whatumanawa, tōna hinengaro, tōna auahatanga, tōna ngākau, tōna pūmanawa. Nā, ka tipu ngātahi te wairua me te tinana i roto i te kōpu o te whāea, whānau noa.
- 1.2 Tino motuhake ēnei āhuatanga katoa. Ko tēnei hoki te kākano i ruia mai i Rangiātea. E kore ia e ngaro. Ēngari, ko ta ngā mātua, ko ta te whānau, ko tā te kura hoki, he mea awhi, he mea whāngai, he mea whakaako i te tamaiti kia tipu ora ai tōna katoa i roto i te tika me te maungārongo.
- 1.3 Kia pakeke te tangata, kei ā ia anō ana tikanga, māna anō e whakatau ko tewhea te huarahi e hiahia ana ia ki te whai, otirā e tika ana mōna. Heoi anō, ahakoa iti, ahakoa rahi kei ā ia tēnei. Ēngari, mehemea i tipu ora tōna katoa, e kore ia e pāheke ki te hē.
- 1.4 Ko te ngākau te mata me te kuaha o te wairua. Otirā, ko te whiu o te kupu, ko te wero, ko te riri, ko te aroha, ko te humārire, me ēnei āhuatanga katoa he mea kuhu ki te ngākau titi tonu ki te wairua. Koia nei te tīmatanga o te kōrero. `kia ngākau māhaki'. Mā tēnei hoki ka tika te kōrero, `He oranga ngākau he pikinga waiora'.
- 1.5 He tapu te tangata ahakoa ko wai. Kohungahunga mai, tamariki mai, tupakeke mai, kaumātua mai, he tapu katoa. Kia kaua te hunga o ngā Kura Kaupapa Māori e tūkino, e whakaiti, e whakaparahako i te tangata, e mahi pūhaehae rānei ki ētahi atu. Kia ngākau māhaki rātau ki a rātau, ki te iwi whānui, ki a Tauiwi hoki.
- 1.6 He tapu tō te wahine he tapu anō tō te tāne. Kia kaua tētahi e whakaiti i tētahi. Ēngari kia whakanui tētahi i tētahi i runga i te mōhio mā te mahi ngātahi a te wahine me te tāne e tipu ora ai ngā tamariki me te iwi hoki.
- 1.7 He tapu te tinana o te tangata. Nō reira he mahi nui tērā, ko te whakaako i te tamaiti ki ngā āhuatanga whakapakari i tōna tinana, kia tipu ai tōna hauora. Kia mōhio te hunga tamariki ki ngā kai pai ki ngā kai kino. Kia mōhio hoki ki te painga o te korikori tinana, o te mirimiri tinana, o ngā rongoa a Tāne Whakapiripiri. Kia kaua ia e tukino i tona tinana i te tinana hoki o tētahi atu.

2. Te Reo

- 2.1 He tapu ngā reo katoa. Nō reira, me whai koha te hunga o ngā Kura Kaupapa Māori ki ngā reo katoa.
- 2.2 Mō ngā tamariki, kia rua ngā reo. Ko te reo o ngā mātua tïpuna tuatahi, ko te reo o tauiwi tuarua. Kia ōrite te pakari o ia reo, kia tu tangata ai ngā tamariki i roto i te ao Māori, i roto hoki i te ao o Tauiwi.
- 2.3 He taonga te reo Māori i roto i te Tiriti o Waitangi, he reo tuturu hoki i roto i te Ture mō te reo. Ēngari kāore he painga o te Tiriti, o te Ture rānei mehemea kāhore te reo i roto i te whatumanawa, i roto i te ngākau, i roto hoki i te māngai o te iwi Māori.
- 2.4 I runga i tēnei whakaaro, kia tere pakari ai te reo o ngā tamariki, me whakahaere ngā mahi katoa o te kura i roto i te reo Māori. Tae atu ki te hunga kuhu mai ki roto i te kura, me kōrero Māori katoa, i ngā wā katoa.
- 2.5 Anō te wā e tika ana mō te whakauru i te reo Tauiwi ki roto i ngā mahi a ngā tamariki. Waiho tēnei mā ia whānau e whakatau. Ko te mea nui kē kia noho wehe ngā reo e rua. He wāhi kē mō te whakaako, he tangata kē hei whāngai i te reo o Tauiwi ki ngā tamariki. Anō, ko te mea nui, kia noho rumaki te reo, kia kaua e kōrero māwhitiwhiti mai i tētahi reo ki tētahi reo.
- 2.6 E tika ana, mā te hunga tino mōhio ki te reo Māori, ki te ao Māori hoki, e ārahi ngā tamariki i roto i a rātau mahi. Ēngari kia tika anō te ngākau me te wairua o tēnei hunga, me whakapono hoki ki te kaupapa whānui o ngā Kura Kaupapa Māori. Heoi anō, me whai aroha tonu te hunga o te kura ki a rātau kāore anō kia tino pakari te reo. Mehemea he tangata tautoko i te kaupapa, āwhinatia. Mehemea e tino ngākau nui ana ki te reo, a tōna wā ka mau.

3. Ngā Iwi

Te piko o te māhuri Tērā te tipu o te rākau

- 3.1 Mō te nuinga o ngā tamariki, tokomaha ngā iwi. Tērā pea mō ētahi, kotahi te iwi. Ko te mea nui kia mōhio ngā tamariki ki ō rātau ake iwi, hapū, whānau hoki. Tua atu o tērā kia hoki ki te katoa o ngā iwi tae noa ki Tauiwi.
- 3.2 Nō reira, he mahi nui tērā te whai haere i ngā whakapapa hei here i ngā tamariki ki ō rātau ake whānau, hapu, iwi, mātua tïpuna hoki. Tua atu o tēnei ko te mōhio ki ngā tūhonohono ki ētahi atu o ngā iwi.
- 3.3 E tika ana kia tu whakahihi te tamaiti i roto i tona ake iwi, ēngari kia whai koha anō ki ngā iwi katoa.
- 3.4 Kia mōhio ngā tamariki ki ngā rohe, ki ngā waka, ki ngā kōrero neherā, ki ngā purākau, ki ngā pakiwaitara, ki ngā tikanga, ki ngā waiata, ki ngā āhuatanga katoa o tōna ake iwi. Kia mōhio anō ki ngā āhuatanga katoa e pā ana ki ērā atu o ngā iwi tae noa ki ētahi o ngā iwi o tāwāhi.



- 3.5 Me whai haere anō hoki ngā tamariki i ngā āhuatanga whānui e pā ana ki ō rātau iwi tae noa ki ēnei rā.
- 3.6 Mā te rongo a te tamaiti ki te awhi, ki te arataki, ki te tautoko, ki ngā tohutohu a te Whānau me tōna aroha hoki, e mau ai tōna piripono ki te Whānau. He mea hopu te nuinga o ēnei tuāhua. Nō reira, e tika ana kia piri tonu te Whānau ki ngā tamariki i roto o te kura, i roto i ā rātau mahi hoki.
- 3.7 Kia rongo te tamaiti ki te rekareka o te Whānau mō āna mahi pai, ki te pāpōuri hoki o te Whānau mō āna mahi hē. Ko tēnei te timatanga o te pupuri i te tamaiti ki te huarahi tika, me tōna tu pakari i roto i tōna wā.
- 3.8 Kia kite ngā tamariki ko te Whānau tonu e whakahaere ana i te kura, ko te Whānau hoki e mahi ngātahi ana me ngā pouako, ka tipu ia me te mōhio ko te wairua me te mana Maori motuhake e kākahu ana i ā ia me tōna kura.
- 3.9 Ehara i te mea mō ngā tamariki anake te kura. He mātauranga anō kei te kura mō ngā tupakeke, mō te katoa o te Whānau hoki mehemea ka hiahia whakatū wānanga rātau mō rātau.
- 3.10 Mō te whakaako pouako hou, ko te kura anō te wāhi tika hei timatanga mā rātau, kia riro anō mā te Whānau rātau e arataki i roto i te mahi whakatipu, whakaako tamariki.

4. Te Ao

ka pū te rūha ka hao te rangatahi

- 4.1 Ko tōna ake kāinga te ao tuatahi me te kura timatanga o te tamaiti. Tua atu o tēnei ko te ao Māori. Mā te Kura Kaupapa Māori ia e ārahi i roto i ēnei nekeneke tae noa ki tōna kura whakamutunga, arā, ki te ao whānui me ōna āhuatanga katoa.
- 4.2 Kia kaua te tamaiti e herea ki te ao kohatu. Kia wātea hoki ia ki te kapo mai i ngā painga, i ngā māramatanga katoa o te ao whānui.
- 4.3 Hāunga tēra, ko te timatanga tika mōna, ko te whai haere tonu i ngā kōrero tuku iho o ngā mātua tïpuna e pā ana ki te timatanga o te taiao.
- 4.4 Kia whai koha ngā tamariki kia Papatuanuku rāua ko Ranginui me ā rāua tamariki e tiaki nei i te hā o ngā moana, o te whenua, o te rangi mō ō rātau āhuatanga katoa.
- 4.5 Kia tipu te miharo o ngā tamariki ki ngā mea ora, ki ngā mea tipu katoa. Kia kaua e tūkinotia.
- 4.6 Kia tipu ngā tamariki hei kaitiaki i ngā painga huhua o te whenua, o te moana, o ngā ngahere kia mau hoki ki ngā ture tuku iho o ngā mātua tīpuna, e pā ana ki te moana, ki te whenua, ki te ngahere.
- 4.7 Kia whaia anō e ngā tamariki ngā ture o te ao, otirā ngā putaiao e pā ana ki te moana, ki te whenua, ki te rangi, ki ngā tātaitai hoki.

5. Āhuatanga Ako

Tamariki wāwahi tahā Aratakina ki te matāpuna O te mōhio, o te ora, o te maungarongo

Whaia te iti kahurangi Te tuohū koe Me he maunga teitei

- 5.1 Ko ngā āhuatanga ako katoa he mea mahi i roto i te koanga ngākau, me te whakaihiihi hinengaro.
- 5.2 Ko te tino painga o te karakia he mea whakatau i te wairua, whakawātea, i te whatumanawa me te hinengaro, whakarata i te ngākau, whakataka i ngā raru, kia ngāwari ai te whakauru atu ki te mahi kua whakaritea hei mahi.
- 5.3 He mea whakaihiihi i te tamaiti te noho o te pakeke ki tona taha hei toko mona i roto i ana mahi. Heoi ano, ko te awhi ko te tautoko i a ia. Engari kia kaua e riro ma te pakeke e mahi te mahi a te tamaiti.
- 5.4 He mea nui te noho wahangū me te whakarongo mō ngā tamariki. Ma te mau o tēnei tuāhua e rongo ai ngā tamariki ki te hōhonutanga o te kōrero.
- 5.5 He mea tāpiri atu ki te whakarongo, ko te titiro, ko te raweke, ko te makamaka pātai, ko te whitiwhiti kōrero, ko te āta whakaaro, hei whakauru i te mātau me te aroa.
- 5.6 Ko ngā kaumātua ngā kaipupuri o ngā tikanga Maori, ko rātau hoki ngā pūkōrero. He mea nui tēra kia piri mai rātau ki te kura ki ngā tamariki hoki hei kaiako, hei kaiarahi.
- 5.7 He mea nui tēra te manaaki tangata. Kia kite ngā tamariki i te āhua o te manaaki, i tōna kainga, i te kura, i te marae. A tōna wā ka kia tu rātau ki te awhina i ngā mahi manaaki.
- 5.8 Ko roto i tōna ake hunuku te timatanga o te whanaungatanga o te tamaiti arā ki ōna tungāne/ tuāhine, tuākana/tēina. Anō kei roto anō i tona hunuku tōna rongo ki ngā tikanga tika e pā ana ki ngā pakeke me ngā kōhungahunga. Me haere anō hoki ēnei tuāhua i roto i te kura. Kia mōhio ai ngā tamariki tupakeke ki te tiaki i ngā kōhungahunga, kia whakarongo hoki ngā kōhungahunga ki ngā tamariki tupakeke.
- 5.9 Nā tēnei tuāhua e tika ai te kōrero, kia kaua e taikaha ngā mahi wehe i ngā kōtiro me ngā tamatāne, i ngā tupakeke me ngā kōhungahunga hoki. Anō te wā e tika ana mō te mahi wehe i runga i te pakeke o ngā tamariki. Anō te wā e tika ana kia mahi whānau rātau. Otirā, kia riro ma ngā tamariki pakeke e arataki ngā tamariki kōhungahunga.
- 5.10 He mea tino nui te wāhi ako hei whakaohooho i te wairua o te tamaiti ki āna mahi whakaako. Nō reira, kia kikï tonu te kura i ngā mea whakaihiihi i a ia, i ngā mea pupuri hoki i te hā o te ao Maori. Me whakawhānui hoki tōna wāhi ako ki ngā marae, ki ngā ngahere, ki waenga pārae, ki te taha moana, ki ngā wharepukapuka, whare taonga me ēra atu whare whare whāngai i te puna o te mōhio.

- 6.1 Kia mau, kia noho whakaaraara, noho koi te hinengaro o te tamaiti ki ngā mātau katoa hei arahi i ā ia i roto i te ao hou.
- 6.2 Kia toa ia ki te whakarongo, ki te whakaaro, ki te kōrero, ki te pānui, ki te tuhi i roto i te reo Maori i roto i te reo o Tauiwi hoki.
- 6.3 Kia tipu ngā āhuatanga tuku iho o tōna pumanawa ki ngā tihi teitei o te taumata.
- 6.4 Kia noho ohooho tona auahatanga i roto i ngā mahi waihanga o tona ao.
- 6.5 Kia noho tuwhera tona ngākau ki te hari, ki te koa, ki te aroha, arā, kia ngākau nui, kia ngākau mahaki.
- 6.6 Kia mau ki tōna whatumanawa ngā hōhonutanga o te ako o te mōhio.
- 6.7 Kia rangona tōna ihi, tōna wehi, tōna tapu.
- 6.8 Kia tipu tōna mana me tōna rangatiratanga.
- 6.9 Kia ita tōna mauri.
- 6.10 Kia puāwai tōna waiora me tōna hauora i roto i te hono tāngaengae o tōna wairua me tōna tinana.
- 6.11 Kia mau tuhonohono te here o tōna ihomatua ki ōna mātua tïpuna, piki ake i ngā Rangi Tūhāhā ki te marae ātea o Io-Matua.
- 6.12 Kia tū pakari, tū rangatira ia hei raukura mō tōna iwi.
